Year 6 – ART AND DESIGN

Coverage in Year 6

- Should be taught to create sketch books to record their observations and use them to review and revisit ideas exploring ideas and recording experiences.
- use a range of materials with creativity with experimentation and increased control.
- Should be taught about great artists, architects and designers in history and understand the historical and cultural development of their art forms: learn about art and design in the history and culture of Britain and the wider world.
- produce creative work; improve mastery of art and design techniques

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Year 6 – DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY

Coverage in Year 6

Design:

- use research and develop design criteria to inform the design of innovative, functional, appealing products that are fit for purpose, aimed at particular individuals or groups
- generate, develop, model and communicate their ideas.

Make:

- select from and use a wider range of tools and equipment to perform practical tasks.

Evaluate:

- investigate and analyse a range of existing products
- evaluate their ideas and products and consider the views of others to improve their work
- understand how key events and individuals in design and technology have helped shape the world.

Technical knowledge:

- apply their understanding of computing to program, monitor and control their products.

Cooking and nutrition:

- pupils should be taught how to cook and apply the principles of nutrition and healthy eating.

To design, make, evaluate and improve	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Design with the user in mind, motivated by the service a product will offer (rather than simply for profit). • Make products through stages of prototypes, making continual refinements. • Ensure products have a high quality finish, using art skills where appropriate. • Use prototypes, cross-sectional diagrams and computer aided designs. 	
To take inspiration from designers	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Combine elements of design from a range of inspirational designers throughout history, giving reasons for choices. • Create innovative designs that improve upon existing products. • Evaluate the design of products so as to suggest improvements to the user experience. 	

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Year 6 – GEOGRAPHY

Coverage in Year 6

- extend their knowledge and understanding beyond the local area to include the United Kingdom and Europe, North and South America.
- location and characteristics of a range of the world’s most significant human and physical features.
- They should develop their use of geographical knowledge, understanding and skills to enhance their locational and place knowledge.
- understand geographical similarities and differences through the study of human and physical geography.
- describe and understand key aspects of:
 - physical geography, including: climate zones, biomes and vegetation belts
 - human geography, including: economic activity including trade links, and the distribution of natural resources including energy, food, minerals and water
- use maps, atlases, globes and digital/computer mapping to locate countries and describe features studied

To investigate places	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Collect and analyse statistics and other information in order to draw clear conclusions about locations. • Identify and describe how the physical features affect the human activity within a location. • Use a range of geographical resources to give detailed descriptions and opinions of the characteristic features of a location • Use different types of fieldwork sampling (random and systematic) to observe, measure and record the human and physical features in the local area. Record the results in a range of ways. • Name and locate some of the countries and cities of the world and their identifying human and physical characteristics, including hills, mountains, rivers, key topographical features and land-use patterns; and understand how some of these aspects have changed over time.
To investigate patterns	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Understand some of the reasons for geographical similarities and differences between countries. • Describe how locations around the world are changing and explain some of the reasons for change. • Describe geographical diversity across the world. • Describe how countries and geographical regions are interconnected and interdependent.
To communicate geographically	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Describe and understand key aspects of: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • physical geography, including: climate zones, biomes and vegetation belts, rivers, mountains and the water cycle. • human geography, including: settlements, land use, economic activity including trade links, and the distribution of natural resources including energy, food, minerals, and water supplies. • Use the eight points of a compass, symbols and a key to communicate knowledge of the United Kingdom and the world. • Create maps of locations identifying patterns (such as: land use, climate zones, population densities, height of land).

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Year 6 – HISTORY

Coverage in Year 6

- a local history study.
- a non-European society that provides contrasts with British history – one study chosen from: early Islamic civilization, including a study of Baghdad c. AD 900; Mayan civilization c. AD 900; Benin (West Africa) c. AD 900-1300

To investigate and interpret the past	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use sources of evidence to deduce information about the past. • Select suitable sources of evidence, giving reasons for choices. • Use sources of information to form testable hypotheses about the past. • Seek out and analyse a wide range of evidence in order to justify claims about the past. • Understand that no single source of evidence gives the full answer to questions about the past. • Refine lines of enquiry as appropriate.
To build an overview of world history	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Identify continuity and change in the history of the locality of the school. • Give a broad overview of life in Britain from medieval until the Tudor and Stuarts times. • Compare some of the times studied with those of the other areas of interest around the world. • Describe the social, ethnic, cultural or religious diversity of past society. • Describe the characteristic features of the past, including ideas, beliefs, attitudes and experiences of men, women and children.
To understand chronology	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Describe the main changes in a period of history (using terms such as: social, religious, political, technological and cultural). • Identify periods of rapid change in history and contrast them with times of relatively little change. • Understand the concepts of continuity and change over time, representing them, along with evidence, on a time line. • Use dates and terms accurately in describing events.
To communicate historically	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use appropriate historical vocabulary to communicate, including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • dates • time period • era • chronology • continuity • change • century • decade • legacy. • Use literacy, numeracy and computing skills to a exceptional standard in order to communicate information about the past. • Use original ways to present information and ideas.

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Year 6 – Languages

Coverage in Year 6

- understand and respond to spoken and written language from a variety of authentic sources
- speak with increasing confidence, fluency and spontaneity, finding ways of communicating what they want to say, including through discussion and asking questions, and continually improving the accuracy of their pronunciation and intonation
- can write at varying length, for different purposes and audiences, using the variety of grammatical structures that they have learnt, discover and develop an appreciation of a range of writing in the language studied.
- Comprehension:
 - Of spoken & written language
 - Ability to respond in speaking confidently and fluently with accurate pronunciation and intonation.
 - Writing for different audiences

To read fluently	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Read and understand the main points and some of the detail in short written texts. • Use the context of a sentence or a translation dictionary to work out the meaning of unfamiliar words. • Read and understand the main points and opinions in written texts from various contexts, including present, past or future events. • Show confidence in reading aloud, and in using reference materials.
To write imaginatively	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Write short texts on familiar topics. • Use knowledge of grammar (or pitch in Mandarin) to enhance or change the meaning of phrases. • Use dictionaries or glossaries to check words. • Refer to recent experiences or future plans, as well as to everyday activities. • Include imaginative and adventurous word choices. • Convey meaning (although there may be some mistakes, the meaning can be understood with little or no difficulty). • Use dictionaries or glossaries to check words.
To speak confidently	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Understand the main points and opinions in spoken passages. • Give a short prepared talk that includes opinions. • Take part in conversations to seek and give information. • Refer to recent experiences or future plans, everyday activities and interests. • Vary language and produce extended responses. • Be understood with little or no difficulty.
To understand the culture of the countries in which the language is spoken	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Give detailed accounts of the customs, history and culture of the countries and communities where the language is spoken. • Describe, with interesting detail, some similarities and differences between countries and communities where the language is spoken and this country.

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Year 6 – MUSIC

Coverage in Year 6

- play and perform in solo and ensemble contexts, using their voices and playing musical instruments with increasing accuracy, fluency, control and expression
- improvise and compose music for a range of purposes using the inter-related dimensions of music
- listen with attention to detail and recall sounds with increasing aural memory
- use and understand staff and other musical notations
- appreciate and understand a wide range of high-quality live and recorded music drawn from different traditions and from great composers and musicians
- develop an understanding of the history of music.

To perform	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Sing or play from memory with confidence. • Perform solos or as part of an ensemble. • Sing or play expressively and in tune. • Hold a part within a round. • Sing a harmony part confidently and accurately. • Perform skillful playing (instrument).
To compose	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Create songs with verses and a chorus. • Create rhythmic patterns with an awareness of timbre and duration. • Combine a variety of musical devices, including melody, rhythm and chords. • Thoughtfully select elements for a piece in order to gain a defined effect. • Convey the relationship between the lyrics and the melody. • Use digital technologies to compose, edit and refine pieces of music. • Use digital technologies to compose pieces of music.
To transcribe	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Use the standard musical notation of crotchet, minim and semibreve to indicate how many beats to play. • Read and create notes on the musical stave. • Understand the purpose of the treble and bass clefs and use them in transcribing compositions. • Understand and use the # (sharp) and ♭ (flat) symbols. • Use and understand simple time signatures.
To describe music	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Choose from a wide range of musical vocabulary to accurately describe and appraise music including: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • <i>pitch, dynamics, tempo, timbre, texture, lyrics and melody, sense of occasion, expressive, solo, rounds, harmonies, accompaniments, drones, cyclic patterns, combination of musical elements, cultural context.</i> • Describe how lyrics often reflect the cultural context of music and have social meaning.

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Year 6 – PE

Coverage in Year 6

Enjoy collaborating, communicating and competing with each other.

Play competitive games, modified where appropriate, such as football, netball, rounders, cricket, hockey, basketball, badminton, rounders and tennis and apply basic principles suitable for attacking and defending.

Take part in gymnastics activities to develop strength, technique, control and balance.

Take part in athletics activities and Perform dances.

Take part in outdoor and adventurous activity challenges both individually and within a team.

Swimming and water safety: Take swimming instruction.

To develop practical skills in order to participate, compete and lead a healthy lifestyle

Games	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Choose and combine techniques in game situations. • Work alone, or with team mates in order to gain points or possession. Uphold the spirit of fairness and respect in competitions, lead others and act as a good role model. • Strike a ball with accuracy and use forehand and backhand in racket games. • Field, defend and attack tactically by anticipating the direction of play. • Choose the most appropriate tactics for a game.
Dance	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Compose and perform creative and imaginative dance sequences. • Perform expressively and hold a precise and strong body posture. • Express an idea in original and imaginative ways. • Plan to perform with high energy, slow grace or other themes and maintain • Perform complex moves that combine strength and stamina gained through gymnastics
Gymnastics	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Create complex and well-executed sequences that include a full range of movements including: <i>travelling, balances, swinging, springing, flight, vaults, inversions, rotations, bending, stretching and twisting, gestures, linking skills.</i> • Hold shapes that are strong, fluent and expressive. • Include in a sequence set pieces, choosing the most appropriate linking elements. • Vary speed, direction, level and body rotation during floor performances. • Practise and refine the gymnastic techniques used in performances (listed above). • Demonstrate good kinesthetic awareness • Use equipment to vault and to swing (remaining upright).
Swimming	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Swim over 100 metres unaided. • Use breast stroke, front crawl and back stroke, ensuring that breathing is correct. • Swim fluently with controlled strokes and tTurn efficiently at the end of a length.
Athletics	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Combine sprinting with low hurdles over 60 metres. • Choose the best place for running over a variety of distances. • Throw accurately and refine performance by analysing technique and body shape. • Show control in take-off and landings when jumping. • Compete and keep track of personal best performances, setting targets for improvement.
Outdoor and adventurous activities	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Select appropriate equipment for outdoor and adventurous activity. • Identify risks and ways to manage them, asking for and listening carefully to advice. • Embrace both leadership and team roles and gain the commitment and respect of a team. • Empathise with others and offer support without being asked. Seek support if in any doubt. • Remain positive even in the most challenging circumstances, rallying others if need be. • Use a range of devices in order to orientate themselves. • Quickly assess changing conditions and adapt plans to ensure safety comes first.

To understand beliefs and teachings	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Explain how some teachings and beliefs are shared between religions. • Explain how religious beliefs shape the lives of individuals and communities.
To understand practices and lifestyles	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Explain the practices and lifestyles involved in belonging to a faith community. • Compare and contrast the lifestyles of different faith groups and give reasons why some within the same faith may adopt different lifestyles. • Show an understanding of the role of a spiritual leader.
To understand how beliefs are conveyed	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Explain some of the different ways that individuals show their beliefs.
To reflect	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Recognise and express feelings about their own identities. Relate these to religious beliefs or teachings. • Explain their own ideas about the answers to ultimate questions. • Explain why their own answers to ultimate questions may differ from those of others.
To understand values	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Explain why different religious communities or individuals may have a different view of what is right and wrong. • Show an awareness of morals and right and wrong beyond rules (i.e. wanting to act in a certain way despite rules). • Express their own values and remain respectful of those with different values.
